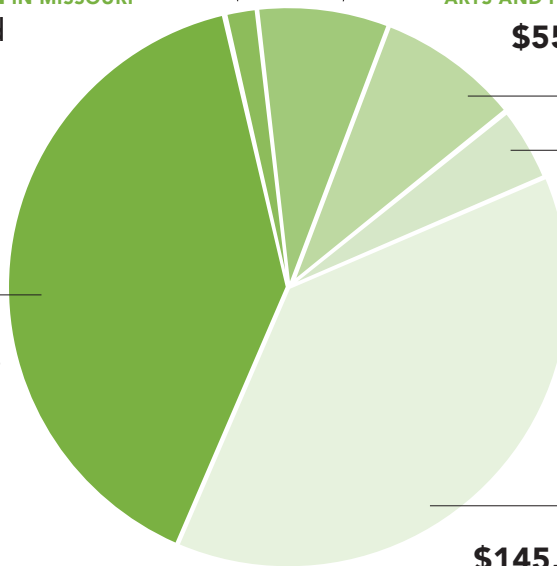

2022 GRANT RECIPIENTS

Truman Heartland Community Foundation works with nonprofits that share our passion and vision of improving area communities. Our grants are considered investments in our community, and we look for a big return on the investments. We search for ways to leverage additional funding and resources to make grants of impact across the region. Two separate competitive grant programs are available through Truman Heartland Community Foundation, the Community Grants Program and the Jelley Family Foundation Endowment for Children's Education. Applicants may receive funding from the Community Grants Program and the Jelley Family Foundation Endowment for Children's Education, but not for the same project or proposal.

JELLEY FAMILY FOUNDATION ENDOWMENT FOR CHILDREN'S EDUCATION GRANT AWARDS

These grant awards focus on educational initiatives for children, ranging from early childhood through traditional post-secondary education.



2022 JELLEY AWARDEES

BikeWalkKC

\$7,500

Funding will be used for equipment and program costs to deliver BikeWalkKC's Safe Routes to School programming in more Eastern Jackson County schools and meet the agency's long-term goals.

Camp Encourage

\$5,500

Funds will support general operations and mission to provide youth with autism spectrum disorder meaningful experiences in which they build the knowledge, courage, and skills to be empowered participants in the community.

Community Services League

\$25,000

Funds will support the Student Stability Initiative (SSI) a program that addresses the negative outcomes for children from educational disruption caused by family transiency and homelessness.

Drumm Farm Center for Children

\$20,000

Funds will support the Educational Support Program. Teachers provide learning interventions to eliminate gaps in reading and math and support success across school coursework.

Horsepower Experimental Learning Program

\$12,000

Funds will support general operations and mission to offer relational experiences to at-risk youth by developing life-coping skills in an equine-facilitated ranch environment.

Jewish Family Services

\$5,000

Funds will support the In-School Mental Health Counseling Program for Eastern Jackson County Schools. Providing on-site mental health counseling to students at Fort Osage High School as an extension of their YouBeYou teen mental health program.

Junior Achievement of Middle America, Inc.

\$15,715

Funds will be used to support the program, Pathways for Underserved Students in Raytown Quality Schools, including BizTown & hosting a Career Exploration Fair. The program focuses on inspiring, preparing, and enabling youth to achieve their greatest potential across the K-12 academic journey.

Marian Hope

\$6,000

Funds will support upgrades for Technology Resources that are used to implement the unique and innovative approach to individualized education. Technology plays an important role as a multi-sensory strategy and complements hands-on learning.

Metropolitan Community College Foundation

\$10,000

Funds will support MCC-Blue River's Summer Bridge Program which will provide bookstore scholarships for students who complete the summer program and enroll in fall classes.

Mother's Refuge

\$8,000

Funds will support the Early Intervention Education program that provides a curriculum for young mothers and their infants to follow to develop a healthy attachment pattern with one another.

Pro Deo Youth Center

\$10,000

Funds will support general operations and mission to build relationships to empower vulnerable teens in a safe and inclusive environment.

Puppetry Arts Institute

\$7,500

Funds will support the Enhancing Communication and Creative Arts Skills Through Puppetry program. Curriculum-supported field trips provide opportunities for creativity, language development, and communication skills through puppet painting workshops and performances.

Raytown Parents as Teachers

\$3,190

Funds will support the Parents as Teachers program and its efforts to become an Affiliate with Parents as Teachers National Center. This status will ensure that the program remains a top-quality Parents as Teachers program.

Kansas City

\$10,000

Funds will support KC School-Readiness Program that supplies doctors and nurses with developmentally appropriate books for children, birth to age 5. Books are used as developmental assessment tools and to express the importance of parents reading, playing, and singing to their children.

HISTORY HIGHLIGHTS

1982

Independence Community Foundation is incorporated by ten citizens

1983

First meeting of the Board is held on October 29 – Warren Higgins serves as Chairman

1986

Major gift of \$100,000 endowment is established by a local donor to benefit Hope House and Sunshine Center.

1988

Community Grants Process is developed as funds grow to \$167,158

1994

Independence Community Foundation and Independence Regional Health Center Foundation merged Boards and assets that resulted in a permanent grantmaking program with assets of nearly \$2MM. Community of Christ committed \$1MM over five years to grow the Foundation. President and CEO Bob Glaser and Donor Relations Officer Liz McClure join the Foundation.

HISTORY HIGHLIGHTS

1995

Public awareness campaign increases total assets to \$3MM. Office Manager, Nancy Wilhelm is invited to join the Foundation team.

1996

Board resolves to change the Foundation name to Truman Heartland Community Foundation to better reflect the regional impact.

1997

THCF grew to \$6MM in assets, a 50% growth from the previous year.

1998

THCF forms a Youth Advisory Council to involve High School students in philanthropy at the direction of Chairwoman Barbara Potts.

1999

THCF hires new CEO, Dr. Paul Thomson. Assets grow to \$15.5MM. Jackson County Free Health Clinic is formed under the THCF leadership.

2001

Total assets reach \$20MM and total grants awarded \$1.3MM.

Coldwater of Lee's Summit

\$8,000

Funds will be used to help purchase up to 100 20-pound produce boxes at least once a month for families who receive groceries through Coldwater's food pantry. Each box contains a variety of fruits and vegetables.

Community Services League

\$10,000

Funds will be used to purchase additional signage. Lighted, larger exterior signage, along with door signs, internal signage, and the availability of bi-lingual menus (Spanish).

\$11,318

Funds will be used to purchase and provide crucial supplies and equipment that help offer high-quality day services programming at the Independence, MO location.

EPEC the Grooming Project

\$10,000

Funds will support general operations and mission to empower families to become self-reliant through the provision of job training, affordable housing, and life skills education focused on ending the cycle of poverty.

Friends of the Rice-Tremonti Home Association

\$5,000

Funds will support general operations and mission to preserve one of the most historic residences in Jackson County, MO, built in 1844, and promote the history of the area regarding the Santa Fe, Oregon, and California Trails.

Gilda's Club Kansas City

\$4,494

Funds will be used to conduct distress screenings, Personal Care Plan preparation, and conducting two Support Groups at Saint Luke's East for members of the community.

Giving the Basics, Inc.

\$6,000

Funds will be used to partially support Giving the Basics School Program, which is offered in 59 schools in Eastern Jackson County and available to 23,000 students.

Heritage Philharmonic

\$5,000

Funds will be used to create and implement The Youth Transitional Living program that serves homeless teens, ages 16-24, for up to 24 months, specifically in Eastern Jackson County.

THCF assets increase to more than \$28MM with more than 600 donor funds.

2014

Total assets of \$35MM and annual grants of \$3.5MM.

2015

The first Elizabeth Hill McClure Scholarship was awarded to Tristen Caudle.

 THCF receives Regional Leadership Award from Mid-America Regional Council for its Community for All Ages coalition initiative.
- 2019**
 Total assets of \$54.4MM and annual grants of \$4.8MM.
- 2020**
 Began a new community initiative, Job Skills for New Careers, aiming to improve the economic status of individuals and families.
- 2021**
 A record year for annual contributions (\$24MM), 64 new funds and 94 individuals graduated from the Job Skills for New Careers initiative.

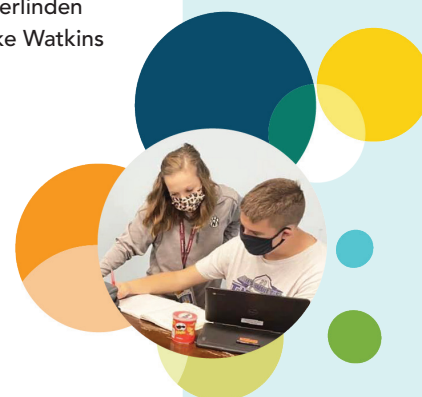
